CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE

Ingredients:

150g Self-raising flour 30g of Cocoa

1 tsp baking powder

175g Muscovado sugar

175g butter, softened

3 eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

50g dark chocolate, melted

Fudge Icing

200g butter, softened 200g icing sugar 200g dark chocolate, melted

METHOD

- 1. Heat oven to 180c/ fan 170c/ gas4
- 2. Line and butter 2 x 20cm sandwich tins
- 3. Put all cake ingredients into the food processor and whisk until smooth. If the mix is a little stiff, add 1-2 tbsp of water and whisk again
- 4. Divide between tins, level and bake for 20 minutes or until springy. Leave for 5 minutes then cool on rack
- 5. Clean the food processor. whisk the butter and icing sugar, add the chocolate, whisk again, then sandwich and ice the cake.

Then bring your cake to the Fête to get judged

A MESSAGE FROM CLLR DOMINIC MUNS Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

Whilst thankfully, fuel prices at the petrol pumps have reduced slightly over the last few weeks, I expect, like me, you have concerns about the cost of living, especially as winter approaches. I am pleased that Wiltshire Council has been getting on with distributing the £150 Government energy rebate on council tax bills for households in bands A-D. 140,000 eligible households in Wiltshire have now received their rebate and the council is now working on a further discretionary fund for people on low incomes who live in properties banded E-H. Anyone who has any queries about these rebates should call the revenues team at Wiltshire Council on Tel: 0300 456 0109.

Over the next few months many of us should benefit from further assistance with all households receiving £400 off energy bills starting in October. The £400 (non-repayable) discounts from energy suppliers will be paid to consumers over 6 months with payments starting from October 2022. However, more needs to be done. I am not anti-capitalism by any stretch of the imagination but when you have an energy crisis with millions struggling financially it makes me angry to see billion dollar quarterly profits for oil companies or multi-million pound bonuses for energy company bosses. Clearly the balance between adequate taxation and encouraging business to the UK is off.

The background to the global increase in energy costs is complex, and there is a huge task ahead for our next PM, whoever they will be. In the meantime, I would like to promote the Warm and Safe Wiltshire strategy, a commitment from Wiltshire Council and Dorset and Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service. The energy advice line can provide support with the installation of draught-proofing measures, smoke alarms to improve fire safety and advice on reducing energy use, switching energy suppliers, reducing condensation and damp problems, and controlling heating. There are also Government schemes to further reduce the cost of work, or to pay for it completely if you are unable to afford the cost yourself. Finally, I must express my congratulations to all students who have been working hard for their A-Levels and other qualifications. It has been an incredibly testing time for those in education with this year's cohort experiencing unprecedented upheaval thanks to Covid. Whatever your grades, you deserve a huge amount of respect for keeping your heads in the books and showing such resilience. EASTERTON BROOK

Occupiers of land alongside the brook are reminded of the riparian responsibilities to cut back <u>and remove</u> vegetation likely to cause an obstruction of the flow, especially during periods of heavy rainfall.

It has to be mentioned that the cutting of vegetation <u>without removing as much as possible</u> from next to the head of the brook in the vicinity of Eastcott Common has resulted in much of this vegetation being washed down the brook to collect against banks and the entrance to culverts further down the system. Please be aware and guard against the consequences of your actions by removing all cuttings to a place of safety.

Control of Summer growth on banks and the use of herbicides in or near water [see Appendix 2 EA guidance)

Great caution has to be employed if herbicides are to be considered - the regulations are considerable, you or your contractor has to have a NPTC (National Proficiency Tests Council) certificate, and the Environment Agency says that it should take you less than one hour to fill in the form!

ENERGY SCAMS ON THE RISE

Criminals are using the cost-of-living crisis to create new scams to part you from your money.

One strategy that exploits the cost-of-living crisis involves fraudsters sending you an email pretending to be from your energy supplier. You are invited to claim a refund as there has been a "miscalculation" on your bill. But you have to supply your bank details, which the crooks then use to steal your money. HANG UP and DO NOT GIVE YOUR BANK DETAILS. Be on your guard and look for errors in emails or text messages. Check if the email address matches the official energy provider contact details.

Another ploy comes as a text message where you are asked to claim or apply for a cost-of-living payment from the government. Ignore these texts. The government's energy grant will be applied automatically as a credit to your energy bill in October. The £150 council-tax rebate is paid automatically to eligible homes paying by direct debit. If you don't pay by direct debit, your council will contact you.

ST BARNABAS CHURCH NEWS

After a dry and hot August here are some details about services in September. We are now into what the church describes as Creationtide - the season involving Harvest and all that entails, which seems to me an important season, considering all the challenges we have to the environment.

The RSPB highlighted Our rare and wonderful wildlife

We're lucky to share our landscapes with some rare and wonderful wildlife, like ospreys, puffins, nightingales, and dormice. But to survive and begin to thrive, these creatures need healthy habitats that fit their needs. For almost thirty years, **the Habitats Regulations** have been the powerful laws which protect these spaces.

These regulations make sure damaging building work isn't carried out in special habitats, or in exceptional cases, that new habitats are created elsewhere to replace them. These laws give nature a voice in decision making. But now, at a time when nature needs them more than ever, there is a threat that the Habitats Regulations will be weakened or taken away altogether. Let's look at just a few of the places safeguarded by the Habitats Regulations:

Wiltshire Chalk Downland

Wiltshire's chalk downland is the largest remaining area of chalk grassland in western Europe and makes up half the remaining chalk habitat in the whole of the UK. Its rolling fields of corn and colourful flower meadows are the perfect place to spot skylarks, hares, and butterflies. At RSPB Winterbourne Downs, we're working to create more chalk grassland to act as a stepping-stone between Salisbury Plain and Porton Down, so that important species can travel safely.

Protected by the Habitat Regulations, this chalk landscape is one of the few remaining strongholds for the stone-curlew - supporting a third of the UK breeding populations. Stone-curlews prefer peace and quiet and can be really sensitive to noisy human activities. So recent plans for housing developments could have damaged the already vulnerable stone-curlew populations here. Luckily, the Habitats Regulations meant that developers have followed strategic approaches and reduced disruption. Plus, the RSPB uses these regulations to work with Wiltshire Council to check bird numbers and to support landowners in providing safe nesting spaces for the birds.

Why solar panels could combat the rising cost of energy bills

Installing solar panels could be the answer to rising energy bills Do you have a south-facing roof? Shaving some money off rising energy bills by generating your own power is becoming ever more appealing – so much so that solar-panel installation firms are reporting a four-fold increase in orders this year compared with 2021. High installation costs have deterred households in recent years. It costs around £6,500 for the average solar-panel system to be installed on a three-bedroom semi-detached house, according to the Energy Saving Trust. Once your solar panels are up and running you can use your household appliances without it costing you a fortune as long as the sun is shining. The Energy Saving Trust says that the average household could save between £165 and £405 a year with solar panels.

You can also sell back the electricity you don't use to the national grid, but unfortunately you won't be able to charge anything close to what energy firms make you pay. The energy cap put a maximum price on electricity of 28.34p per kilowatt hour (kWh) but the most you can sell your electricity for is 12p per kWh. If you decide to install solar panels, you may want to switch energy provider. The amount they pay you for electricity varies massively, from a miserly 1.5p per kWh from EDF up to 12p per kWh from Octopus Energy.

Invest in a battery and you can store the electricity you generate rather than selling it back to the grid. You'll pay around £2,000 for a 3kWh one, but once you have one it will help you save even more. Eon estimates that solar-panel households with batteries can use 30% more of the power they generate.

BROADBAND TO BECOME MORE ACCESSIBLE FOR STRUGGLING FAMILIES

The Department for Work and Pensions is to run a new service that will allow providers of broadband to verify whether customers are receiving relevant benefits, making them eligible for extra financial support, such as reduced broadband bills.

The verification service will require the customer's permission; however, it would allow them to access 'social tariffs.' The government has called on all broadband providers to offer and promote social tariffs that will help those on Universal Credit and other benefits to access broadband and mobile phone deals.
