Message from Cllr Dominic Muns Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

I support five parish councils and try to make myself available at every monthly meeting, and throughout the month to answer emails, telephone calls and make site visits. As the foundation of local governance, our parish councillors do a fantastic job and I support them fully at every opportunity.

The issue I hear most about from residents is speeding. Every village I cover has a speeding issue to varying degrees. Whether it is 90mph+ on Spin Hill in Market Lavington, or habitual 40mph+ speeds through The Cheverells, West Lavington or Easterton, the impact is the same, added danger for other road users, pedestrians and horse riders. I have a "direct line" to our Police & Crime Commissioner as well as the Roads Policing unit at Wiltshire Police which means I can call on them for speed enforcement where we need it. This, together with my work as Chair of the Local Highways & Footpaths Improvement Group, means I can support our community in tackling speeding and other Highways related problems.

Planning is always an interesting topic to get involved with. Most projects that are considered are straightforward – small extensions, listed building consent, tree work etc. Occasionally we have large and contentious projects, and I am never afraid to fight when a proposal negatively impacts our community. Hedges House in West Lavington is a good example of such an application on which I refused to backdown, instead taking it to the Eastern Area Planning Committee and winning a refusal. There is always the right for an applicant to appeal to the Government's Planning Inspectorate, however, the cost of this (and the risk of losing at appeal) should not see us give up at the first stage.

You may have seen me on ITV recently alongside Victoria Park residents and our MP Danny Kruger. The residents in Victoria Park have put up with failed street lighting, dangerous pavements and a village green that became a building site years ago. The problem lies with the fact that the entire estate, which sits alongside HMP Erlestoke, is owned by the Ministry of Justice. I work closely with our Wiltshire MPs on various matters, and I am pleased to have their personal support when needed, Victoria Park being a great example.

Those of you following the Black Dog Crossroads project will know that I asked both our Cabinet Member for Highways, and a representative from the Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner to accompany me on a site visit to the junction to demonstrate the dangers first-hand. Thankfully my perseverance in attempting to reduce speed on the A360 through the junction resulted in our campaign group gaining two important allies. In June I have a follow-up meeting with the Corporate Director for Place, who sits at the top of the Highways chain to progress things.

Over the last year I have also championed significant improvements to Market Lavington's road infrastructure, formulated plans for waiting restrictions across West Lavington, given my support for Lavington School's Post-16 education offering, and dealt with Wiltshire Police on numerous acts of vandalism and criminal damage. I have also helped individual residents with social housing issues and supported youth focused projects across the area - and that's without even touching on the work I do with the Education & Skills portfolio across the whole of Wiltshire. "I left school at 15 with not a single exam! I joined an engineering firm and became an apprentice for the grand sum of 18s 6d per week (just under £1), most of which I gave to my mother. At 17, with the permission of my parents, I walked into the recruiting office in Leeds and joined the RAF. I completed my initial training at Jurby on the Isle of Man and then went on to Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) where I flew Tiger Moths and Havaards to name a couple of aircraft. I went to Valley, on Anglesey, for jet training and was posted to Germany. I then went on to become a training instructor. Following seven years' service (and many exams!) with the RAF, I applied to join British Overseas Airways Corporation (BOAC) and joined in 1958. Primarily, I flew the Brittania 312, known as the "Whispering Giant". "

NEW KERBSIDE RECYCLING SERVICE FROM MONDAY 5TH JUNE 2023

COLLECTING SMALL RECHARGEABLE ELECTRICAL

Place any of the following in a carrier bag, alongside your blue lidded recycling bin NOT in the bin.

MP3 PLAYERS
ELECTRIC TOOTHBRUSHES
SHAVERS/TRIMMERSALL VAPES AND E-CIGARETTES
SMART WATCHES
MOBILE PHONES
DIGITAL CAMERAS
CHARGING DEVICES/POWER BANKS
WIRELESS EARPHONES.

WHY THESE ITEMS?

Many rechargeable items contain lithium-ion batteries. These can cause fires if not disposed of properly. Unwanted electrical items contain valuable materials including gold, copper, steel and aluminium. these materials can be recovered, re-processed into new products and become valuable commodities to the UK economy.

Please ensure that you remove any personal information or data from such devices listed above. The council cannot accept liability for the security of data or personal information

Recycling Batteries update

In the first 15 months of this collection 15 tonnes of your used batteries were collected for recycling. please continue to place these batteries in a transparent plastic bag and place on top of the blue lidded bin, do not mix these batteries with the rechargeable items

Textiles and shredded paper will no longer be collected from the kerbside.

Successfully recycling textiles has become increasingly difficult - so please take good quality clothing to the charity shops or textile banks but the poor quality textiles not suitable for resale or reuse should be put in the General waste bin for energy recovery.

Shredded paper will not be collected in recycling bins instead please use it as compost or take it to a household recycling centre. Otherwise please put it in the general waste bins for energy recovery. Shredded paper should not be put in your garden waste bin as it is unsuitable for the large scale composting process.

Disposal of useable or unusable paint

Leftover useable household paint at least half full can be brought to the recycling centres. You can also take away donated paint for free.

Unusable liquid paint should be hardened before taking it to recycling centre for disposal. Remove the lid and allow paint to dry completely, or mix paint with soil, pet litter, sawdust or sand.

Donating reusable items

You can now donate good quality reusable items at all recycling centre to support local charities and good causes. Items such as furniture, bric a brac or Bicycles.

Household Recycling Centres changes

HEDGEHOG STREET CAMPAIGN AND HEDGEHOG SURVEYS MADE EASY IN EASTERTON, EASTCOTT AND EASTERTON SANDS

Judy Boyt would like volunteers and householders to set up a group to start the Easterton Parish Hedgehog Street Campaign and surveys.

This will be a great village project to get everyone especially the youngsters to be involved. The aim is to find out how many hedgehogs we have in the parish and to engage the village into considering wildlife and the impact of any development. (This would also lead to spin-off surveys into other species too)

- Doing a Hedgehog (HH) survey has a wider value.
- If you can highlight the value of the land for hedgehogs, then you can lobby for better consideration
 of Hedgehogs, including provision of: commuting routes (i.e. a connected hedgerow network),
 permeable fences/walls (which would otherwise block their movements and block access to
 foraging grounds), and better provision of nesting habitat. It would also push for better
 consideration during any works on site, e.g. to prevent injury/killing when doing ground works

I would like to ask people to get involved by hosting surveys in their gardens using the Hedgehog footprint tunnels to detect hedgehog activity and perhaps set up a camera trap to see what is happening in your garden and area. Please if there are any volunteers who would like to get things started let me know. I will have access to several hedgehog tunnels later this summer otherwise look on the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) website (details below) on how to make one. These surveys can be done between now and October, so there is plenty of time.

Sadly, the iconic hedgehog is now recognised as the most popular wild animal in Britain BUT they are also in severe decline by between 30 - 75% since 2000 nationally and particularly in rural areas. This rate is unsustainable, and although the hedgehog is currently a widespread and common species in the UK, their future is increasingly uncertain.

Hedgehogs consume a wide range of invertebrate prey and are thus indicators of a healthy natural environment. The effect of the loss of a mammal that was formally so abundant on our ecosystem is difficult to predict, but unlikely to be positive.

Hedgehogs can be difficult to detect, being nocturnal and inconspicuous. But with the new technique of Hedgehog Tunnels we can discover when hedgehogs are absent, as well as present in an area. Go to www.ptes.org and look for section on **Guidance for detecting hedgehogs in your garden**

Hedgehogs can thrive in densely built up areas alongside people – so it is more important than ever to know where they are, and to consider them with our land management and future developments.

HEDGEHOG STREET CAMPAIGN AND HEDGEHOG SURVEYS MADE EASY CONT'D

HELP YOUR HEDGEHOGS as they are prone to getting tangled and trapped - Polystyrene/plastic cups, plastic, and elastic bands are all common offenders. Replace netting with a rigid structure or use a thick cordage and keep taut. Sports and garden netting should be tied up or stored inside when not in use.

HEDGEHOGS REALLY BENEFIT FROM EXTRA FOOD, using it as a supplement to their natural diet. Meaty cat or dog food and hedgehog food are all suitable. Water can also be scarce at certain times of the year and is the only thing you should give them to drink. (NOT milk!)

TRACKING TUNNELS ARE SIMPLE, PLASTIC TRIANGULAR TUNNELS.

The tunnels are usually constructed from light, commercially available plastic (e.g. CorrexTM). They contain a removable tracking plate that contains two 'ink' strips, an area for bait and two sheets of paper to record the footprints of the target. Both the front and back feet have 5 toes, the front feet are wider and they look like little hands while the back feet are slimmer and longer.

ACCESS TO WIDE RANGE OF GARDENS REQUIRED BY FORAGING HEDGEHOGS

Hedgehogs roam between 1-2km each night during their active season. It's therefore critical that they can access a wide range of gardens.

13 x 13cm (5 x 5") holes in walls or fences will let hedgehogs through but be too small for most pets. If you've made a hole in your garden wall or fence please visit www.hedgehogstreet.org to put it on our map.

MAKE YOUR PONDS SAFE

Hedgehogs are adept swimmers but cant climb out of steep-sided ponds or pools - they will drown. Use a pile of stones, a piece of wood or some chicken wire to create a simple ramp for them to climb out of the water.

CREATE A WILD CORNER IN YOUR GARDEN

Let plants go mad in a corner of your garden and don't cut them back in winter an hedgehogs might nest in there. Hedgehogs make excellent pest control feeding on slugs, beetles and caterpillars on your organic veg patch. They also like fallen fruit from cherry trees.

HEDGEHOG HOMES AND BEDDING

This will range from a natural log pile, a simple space under a shed. They will also cosy up amongst shrubs and grasses. They like bedding of leaves, and grasses to use in their breeding and hibernation nests.

STOP USING CHEMICALS ON LAWNS AND GARDENS that kill slugs, Snails, invertebrates etc as this is food for hedgehogs.
