Although it was an interesting start with a the flood in the High Street on 4th January 2024!! (see photo) May we say a big thank you to Ben Myerscough and many others for a their prompt action to help those properties and resident who looked like they were going to be flooded. Jonathon Turner's prompt action which helped release some of the backed up water at the screen by the Manor.

The High Street was closed temporarily in order to stop people driving through but also to stop those that tried driving too fast creating a bow wave that would flood houses both sides of the street. The rainwater was coming down Kings Road and Samual Moore's Lane in torrents entering into the stream unabated bring a lot of sediment, mud and sand with it straight into the stream.

The Royal Oak pub had thankfully erected their flood protection across the doors and still remained open with people using the back door. Thank you Nikki and Dave great support too.



The Flood Group will be writing a report to see what happened, why and how to mitigate any further problems in the future.

With this in mind the Flood Group do need new wardens to train up as sadly the existing group are in the more senior category. This is possibly not a one off event in the future and will need monitoring and in the event of flooding the Wardens will play and essential role in warning high street residents in time to take action or help others in the community.

There is a telemetry system on this stream which will AUTOMATICALLY issue warnings to everyone on high street who might be impacted by excess water. This is a direct telephone call. But if you are not registered and/or are new arrivals in the village, please contact the Flood Group and they will help you register so you are prepared.

# PLANNING APPLICATIONS IN EASTERTON PARISH TO NOTE PLEASE TAKE A LOOK IT MAY WELL HAVE AN IMPACT ON YOU PL/2023/10332. Potterne Park Solar Farm

Plans for a 200 acre Solar farm on North facing agricultural land.

(Equivalent to more than 150 football pitches)

Comments and opinions to Wiltshire Council Planning via online: Deadline 1st Feb 2023.

Please do take some time to read about this planning application that although it is on Potterne Park farm the whole site actually in the Easterton Parish Boundary with a small sliver in Market Lavington Parish boundary. There are a lot of documents to read through and an opinion needs to be by February 1st 2024.

Easterton Parish Council and Potterne Parish Council are writing to object on several hard factual grounds based on the Wiltshire Council Core Strategy and the NPPF (the National Planning Policy Framework).

Just to give you a small potted history and why you should consider the impact on your well being and enjoyment of the beautiful natural landscape. of this unique valley full of wildlife and natural landscape.

The Consultants Lighthouse acting on behalf of the developers Stark Energy want to put a 200 acre solar farm on North facing productive agricultural land which is already farmed in the Higher Stewardship scheme which has direct benefit to nature, wildlife and the landscape. <a href="https://www.potternesolar.co.uk">www.potternesolar.co.uk</a>

The original proposal information was only sent out to Easterton and Potterne Parish Council on 24th November telling them that the consultation will be in Potterne Village Hall on 28th November! The Parish Council have subsequently seen that two applications went in on 24th November and then a second one on 27th November so really this consultation was just lip service!

Easterton Councillors attended the consultation and asked the consultant why was this held in Potterne Village when the proposed site is in Easterton Boundary. The next question to them was when were they going to hold a public consultation in Easterton. To date they have not contacted the Parish Council to arrange a face to face consultation. This does not give residents the time or opportunity learn more.



The consultants hadn't familiarised themselves with the area and didn't even have Easterton on the map!

Just to put in context this is what the substation (still under construction at another site) will look like once they have levelled the ground and topsoil. There will be numerous CCTV cameras all around the site including along the Footpaths and bridleway, numerous large shipping size containers housing the inverters.

2M - 3M high fencing all around each field.

Please read for yourself and please make your opinion known online to Wiltshire planning - it is on the planning portal using the planning number **PL/2023/10332**. Please answer factually and personally. This is an important planning application which will affect more of you in the village as well as the residents overlooking the proposed site from both sides of the valley. The scale of the solar site will


destroy a beautiful natural landscape.

Each solar panel will be 3.2 metres high sloping to 800mm so you will be riding or walking through an industrial park with no views across the natural beautiful valley. It will be gone in front of your eyes to become and industrial site for the next 50 years.

This is the wrong thing in the wrong place - this Solar farm is larger than Potterne village and probably equates to 150 plus football pitches.

The photo montage below was taken from Forest Farm (along the bridleway 12) looking across the area towards Potterne Wick. - The red coloured in area is representing the solar panels that you will see from both sides of the valley and when walking the footpaths or bridleways.





The yellow areas on map marks proposed Potterne Park solar farm and One Tree Hill is above Potterne Wick and behind Potterne Village.

The CPRE (Council for Protection of Rural England) are campaigning for more roof space and brownfield sites to be used instead of arable food producing agricultural farm land.

Please help us put a stop to the industrialisation of our historic and valued countryside. Support Potterne Solar Action Group in our campaign to safeguard 266 acres of productive arable land from solar farming and to obtain a Special Landscape Area designation for the valley between Potterne and Lydeway.

Two sites within 1,500m of each other are being targeted by solar farm developers: the iconic landmark of One Tree Hill (Blounts Court solar farm) and the valley of Potterne Park (potternesolar.co.uk). These developments go against NPPF guidelines to protect valued landscapes and sites of biodiversity and to recognise the intrinsic character and beauty of the countryside. They disregard WCS on the careful stewardship of our environmental assets so that growth does not erode the very qualities that make Wiltshire so attractive in the first place.

And they ignore the government's commitment to food security which relies on strong domestic production, including 74% of food which we can grow or rear in the UK for all or part of the year.

Wiltshire County has already met its 2030 targets for solar renewable energy with 42 operational solar farms in the county, and a further 12 under construction or going through the planning process. We already have six solar farms within a five-mile radius of Potterne.

CPRE Wiltshire, who support our campaign, have highlighted the lack of an overall plan for the spatial distribution of renewable energy capacity in the county and the combined effect arising from the local concentration of several solar farms, many of which include substations, giving them an industrial appearance totally out of keeping with the local countryside.
