WHAT'S YOUR STORY?

How long have you lived in Easterton? In May it will be 42 years.

What brought you to Easterton?

Work - my office was in Eastleigh but, unlike most of my colleagues, I didn't want to live in the New Forest and so we came to Easterton. I could get to the office in just under an hour and also did some work from home.

How would you describe your life and who has influenced you most and why?

Peaceful and I have been influenced by many people, relations, people at school and people at work. I have also influenced myself in terms of determination.

Where were you born?

In Nottingham on 2nd September 1948.

Education, where did you go to school/college/ university?

I was at school in Nottinghamshire and then Derbyshire and then went to college. We were living in Stafford and I worked for English Electric as a technician apprentice and the plan was that I would do an HND at City and Guilds but after three years I decided that engineering wasn't for me.

What is/was your favourite/most interesting job?

After leaving English Electric and engineering, I joined Warner-Lambert, a pharmaceutical company, in April 1973 and progressed in sales and marketing. In 1979 I was promoted to Regional Manager for Scotland and the North East and we moved to Fife. I retired in July 2003. During my time there I did so many things - I flew on Concorde and stayed in some of the world's best hotels. We also used to do Outward Bound courses which included abseiling down 200 ft cliffs and yomping over the Brecon Beacons.

Family, tell us a bit about your family

Sally and I were married in 1975 and we have a daughter Sarah and two grandchildren. We also had a son, James, who sadly died of leukaemia in 2007.

What is your greatest achievement? Surviving!

If you could acquire any talent, what would it be? To paint pictures

Who in history do you admire the most and why?

Churchill, he was inspirational and the right person at the right time to rally the people of this country forward.

What is your favourite occupation/hobby?

Playing music, I play the guitar and harmonica and have played semi-professionally. I take after my mother and my music came from her and as a child I stood by the piano as she played it. I joined the Freemasons and became Provincial Grand Master for Wiltshire in 2014 which I held for eight years.

Who is your favourite author?

Charles Dickens and George Orwell. I also enjoy reading biographies and history - I have just read The History of England and I like crime books.

Do you have a favourite composer or music artist?

Beethoven and, as I grew up with The Beatles, Lennon and McCartney.

Is there a plant/flower that is a particular favourite? *Roses and rockery plants.*

What is your favourite film/TV programme? The 39 Steps, any version, and Thelma and Louise.

Do you have a favourite animal, domestic or otherwise? *My dog, a bearded collie.*

If you could eat only one thing for the rest of your days, what would it be? Fish, shellfish in particular.

Is there a place in the world that you would like to visit? Perth in Australia and I would love to go back to Bermuda. My favourite place is Italy. I first went to Venice in 1966 and fell in love with it and have been back there a couple of times.

Has the pandemic changed or impacted you over the last few years?

It hasn't really changed or impacted me other than giving me more work with a lot of Zoom meetings.

A MESSAGE FROM CLLR DOMINIC MUNS Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

The A-road through West Lavington has been renewed and the finished surface is a huge improvement. Last week, following scrutiny of the resurfacing schedule for the wider Devizes area, I asked for Market Lavington's B3098 to be re-prioritised. The stretch between the West Lavington crossroads and Lavington School is particularly bad and whilst I appreciate prioritisation is the correct approach so that the worst and busiest roads are fixed first, it is important that quieter village roads are not constantly overtaken by A-roads elsewhere.

Last month I mentioned that Wiltshire Council has been able to allocate an EXTRA £10m over the next two years to spend on filling potholes, road resurfacing and verge repairs. We are also spending an additional £1m on extra gully cleaning. This is vital if we are to fight back against the weather patterns which see extreme temperatures crack road surfaces, huge rainfall wash material away and freezing temperatures blow the surface apart.

I urge you to watch the recent Panorama episode "Paying More for Less: Councils in Crisis", on BBC iPlayer. Wiltshire is in a really strong position financially, able to invest in infrastructure, avoid closing services, and gaining national recognition for successes. Panorama will show you the issues councils are dealing with and how many are failing. You will hopefully see just how lucky we are in Wiltshire and how much worse things can be without capable management.

Since my election to Wiltshire Council back in 2021, alongside supporting residents on local issues, I have been working hard as Portfolio Holder for Education across the county. I helped create and promote the Wiltshire Learning Alliance which brings Wiltshire schools together to share knowledge and improve academic outcomes. Three months ago we saw Wiltshire's Children's Services judged Outstanding (incredible in the context of the Panorama episode). More locally, I lobbied hard for Lavington School's bid to create a permanent sixth form, pushing our local MP and the Education Minister to acknowledge the strong case presented by both the school and Wiltshire Council. I am incredibly pleased to report that the school was successful in its bid and will be able to offer post-16 education from September next year!

I have recently moved across from Education and taken a Cabinet position in charge of Environment & Waste. This will be a new challenge for me but one I aim to see equal success with. The "Environment" part of the role is very broad and incorporates Climate Change, Public Protection (Trading standards, Licencing etc), Wiltshire Heritage Sites (Stonehenge, Avebury etc), and Waste and Recycling; something for everyone!

The main point I want to make is that my work with local residents across The Lavingtons remains unchanged. You will still see me at all parish council meetings and I remain committed to helping you with any local issues you may have so do not hesitate to drop me a line.

VANDALISM relating to the SIGN EAST14 footpath (top of Eastcott Common)

There is a person(s) who regularly defaces or takes down the red sign 'NO THROUGH ROUTE' - **Why?** This sign was put up by Wiltshire Council to inform walkers for their safety foremost that it is a <u>no through</u> <u>route</u> to the other side of the railway line. It is illegal to cross the railway line and there are no alternative legal routes across the farmland and woodland on either side of the path. Anyone trying to go off piste are trespassing and causing damage to fences keeping livestock in the fields.

The only way is to walk back up the path to the top of East 14. If you wish to cross the railway line either use Folly Wood bridleway or East12, see maps on Easterton PC website.

The Parish Council are bewildered by this act and ask the person (s) who are responsible, if they would like to get in touch with us and explain their actions and reasoning. This would enable us to see if we can be of help to this person and understand their motivation. We look forward to hearing from you



ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE

POTTERNE SOLAR FARM UPDATE

The response to the proposed Potterne solar will be in by the time you read this and at the time of writing they have amounted to over 287 objections so far including your Parish council. We will keep you updated on the decision.

The decision was meant to be 20th March but the word is that the Wiltshire Planning Officer Jonathon James, has not completed his report and is waiting for the applicants to come back with some more information! What information the solar group are not sure. But it looks like the whole thing will be taken to Strategic Committee who will make a decision, this probably wont be for another month or two. So meanwhile we carry on gathering more information and reading about more solar farm applications happening almost on a daily basis around the country. an increase in loss of farmland.

THE LOCAL NATURE RECOVERY STRATEGY (LNRS) FOR WILTSHIRE AND SWINDON are about to implement a 'long list' to identify habitat priorities (the outcomes we wish to achieve for nature) and measures (the actions we need to take to reach those outcomes) for nature recovery.

The LNRS is a requirement for Wiltshire and Swindon councils to prepare in 2024. This link will take you to the Government's website should you wish to remind yourself why this is necessary and important.

Local nature recovery strategies - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)

Each local nature recovery strategy will be specific and tailored to its area. The responsible authorities and people involved in preparing a strategy can choose how they want it to look, but every strategy must contain: 1. A local habitat map. 2. A written statement of biodiversity priorities.

We expect local nature recovery strategies to propose actions such as the: creation of wetlands, restoration of peatlands, planting of trees and hedgerows, waterways maintenance and restoration, more sustainable management of existing woodlands and other habitats like grasslands.
